

Stimulating the Industry

"Stim Bus" Used an Educational Tool
To Raise Awareness of Implant Therapy
Spinal cord stimulation therapy uses a small implantable device that emits electrical impulses designed to replaced the feeling of pain with a tingling or "messaging" sensation that changes the pain signal to the brain.

The procedure is often prescribed for patients who have gone through other treatment programs and still have chronic pain that causes disruptions in their work and personal life.

Once the device is implanted, the user can control the amount of electrical impulses to meet their needs, using a remote control device.

According to a spokesman for Boston Scientific, the primary purpose of the Stim Bus is to create awareness of the procedure to patients and referring physicians. The bus has made previous stops at Johns Hopkins, the Mayo Clinic, Wake Forrest, University of Virginia and at Harvard Medical.
